





A group of women, linked by their involvement with Refugee Women Connect in St Helens, have exchanged gifts of knowledge, care, identity and creativity during 2020. This set of cards is a document of those Whatsapp conversations; of activity packs, distributed by volunteers, completed at the same time in different locations; and a 'socially distanced' walk in the park on a beautifully sunny day.

Refugee Women Connect exists because women asylum seekers and refugees face inequality and are denied social justice. Through their activities women can access a range of emotional and practical support and activities. Refugee Women Connect are proud members of the Sisters Not Strangers coalition who are fighting to bring an end to destitution and ensure the safety of all asylum-seeking and refugee women.

The phrase 'When life gives you lemons, make lemonade' is used to imply that we should make the best out of the unpleasant things in life. But what if that isn't enough?

Women, united, together. Let's throw the lemons back. February 2021 An edition of 100 gift boxes containing eight A5 artworks, and translations in Albanian, Arabic, Spanish and Punjabi.

Each artwork serves both as a document of the exchanges that took place and, as an invitation to the recipient to join in with those actions.
